

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## Delivering extra support at Bad Nauheim

### Teachers stay alert, strive for excellence, kindness

Teachers and administrators had to exercise an extra degree of flexibility at Bad Nauheim Elementary School when instruction resumed at Department of Defense Dependents Schools Sept. 7. Enrollments were below projections and classes had to be juggled, but three weeks later children were immersed in their routines and the learning process hummed along smoothly, said principal Dr. Eugene Perillo.

"I give a lot of credit to Dr. Walker [Dr. Elizabeth Walker, Heidelberg District superintendent] and Diana Ohman [DoDDS-Europe director] for making it happen, for making sure the Soldiers and the families had the time to feel comfortable," he said. The atypical opening was a ripple effect of the 1st Armored Division's extended deployment to Iraq last spring. Many families took their block leave toward the end of summer and returned to Germany later than usual.

"You have to think outside the box. It's not business as usual," said Perillo. He had 125 children on hand rather than the projected 150. He also had to integrate new members on his staff of 25 and find his own place at the helm, having just arrived from Menwith Hill, England.

The school and the community have pulled together to give students a sense of continuity, and the school's intimate

scale has made it easier for everyone to come together, he said. "You have to work as a team. If something's undone, you have to jump in and do it ... and we have teamwork. That's probably the most pleasant part of all this."

Monitoring the effects of last year's long deployment and related stressors that might be affecting

some families prompted the school to activate its Student Support Team as the year began to structure oversight and timely intervention.

"It's a regular education program; it's not special education," said Sharon Breeding, school counselor and team member.

"It's basically a problem-solving program that meets once a week. I keep telling children that I'm a friend, a helper for them and their teachers, and a problem solver. We help them to feel we think they're important and that we're not going to let them get lost," she said.

"There is just a variety of factors that affect children. If we see something going on over two weeks or longer we will take a closer look at it. We'll sit down and brainstorm and come up with two or three strategies for a teacher to use. Then we'll meet in another two weeks and monitor the situation. We'll keep meeting till we find there's been a resolution," said Breeding.

"It's how we can keep the momentum with our own initiatives," said Perillo. "If someone sees trouble, it's being proactive. We're monitoring the discipline, checking attendance as indicators. There's this period of time for relearning, for finding out relationships again, for getting them back. What I see, it's almost like a step-parent was introduced while they were away. It's like they're discovering each other again, and we want to be out in front

of it. We meet weekly and we're keeping our eyes open."

Support from parents and the community at large has been outstanding, said Perillo, praising the Parent Teacher Association for organizing events that draw the community together and strengthen bonds. "Military are coming in and having lunch with their students,



looking over the school. We want to shore up that connection."

"We have a lot of parent volunteers," said Breeding. "The kids all know the parents back us and we back them. It's not us against them. I think our parents do an excellent job of listening to their children's concerns on a regular basis, and if more parents listened to their children the way we do they'd be in the enviable position we're in."

In addition School-Age Services has opened a branch in Bad Nauheim to extend services directly

in the community. Perillo credited the 284th Base Support Battalion command for making that happen.

"Shreve [Lt. Col. Bart Shreve, 284th BSB commander] has been to the community on a regular basis, helping us out with MPs and security among other things. It's a truly genuine interest. He's not just checking boxes. That's special when you're out here alone.

"Our safety and security people especially have made trips down here to support us, Capt. Jemmott [Capt. Mathew Jemmott, 284th BSB

provost marshal] at the PMO. We've got to remain vigilant because we're an outpost, so to speak. We have to consider it in a smart kind of way. Now we're looking at extending it with walking trips, with train trips," said Perillo.

Strong support has allowed teachers to focus on teaching. "I'm pleased to announce that Bad Nauheim has a reputation because of our teaching and our scores. We've got people who know and care about learning. We're blessed that way," he said.

"Our kids do really well academically and we're looking forward to doing even better because they're less stressed," said Breeding.

"The bottom line is there's stuff to learn and you've got to do it," said Perillo. "My sense is that DoDDS is on the forefront of learning standards. You have an expectation as a parent: my kid can read, write, can do the math. That's what Dr. Tafoya [Dr. Joseph D. Tafoya, Department of Defense Education Activity director] is talking about with Math Matters. He's saying, 'This is what your kids are going to learn,' and he's going to deliver."

Bad Nauheim teachers also try to instill the virtues of respect among their young charges, said Breeding. "We're very lucky here. Our children are just wonderful; they're polite, they're confident and they're very assured. And they're very kind. We try to enforce those acts of kindness. We devote a lot of time to modeling this through speaking with them. We do an awful lot of talking about bullying, not that we have a lot of that here, but I want them to have ammunition," she said.

"They're wonderful, very creative at this age, very sweet at this age, they still love to learn," said second-grade teacher Athena Breuer as students spread out around her classroom in four small groups to read, construct poems and listen to stories. "They're all happy to be here. Even if they got in trouble the day before, by the time they come back in the morning they've forgotten about it."

## Soldiers go the distance in Berlin

### Local runners take on city marathon

Ten Baumholder, Friedberg and Giessen Soldiers were among some 36,000 runners to tackle this year's Berlin Marathon Sept. 26. It was the first marathon for all 10 runners.

Baumholder Soldiers began training in July, with PT runs almost daily, and 15-20 mile runs tapered on weekends. The group started with 10 runners, but by the marathon date the group was down to seven.

The 1st Armored Division's 2nd Brigade; 2nd Battalion, 6th Infantry; and 40th Engineer Combat Battalion were represented by Capt. Matthew Graham, 2nd Lt. Adam MacAllister, 2nd Lt. Dan Downs, Sgt. Adam Williams, Cpl. Steve Rojas, Pfc. Joseph Walker and Pfc. Brent Brzuchalski.

"We chose to run a marathon for the challenge of it," said Graham, the team coordinator. "We chose Berlin because it has a flat, scenic, postcard route."

Runners lined up just beyond the Brandenburg Gate facing Victory Column for the start of the race. Since none of the Baumholder runners had a previous marathon time, they started at the back of the pack. Their time was registered by the individual computer chips in their shoes as they crossed the start line.

After passing the 13-mile mark, MacAllister grabbed a cup of water. He sighed as he looked at the marker — not quite halfway through the race. Thinking about the Kenyan champions and the fact that they were approaching the finish line at the same time didn't make

the run ahead any easier, he said.

Runners from Kenya took first through fourth place for the men's side, with Felix Limo's time of 2:06:44 giving him the victory. MacAllister was the first Baumholder representative to cross the finish line, in 3:36:38. His teammates came in one by one over the next two hours.

Brzuchalski crossed the finish line next. "That was the hardest thing I've ever done in my life," Brzuchalski said. He then put his arm around a German runner whom he had met in the last leg of the race. "Thank God for this guy. He pushed me to keep running during mile 25 and 26 when I thought couldn't run any farther, and I don't even know him."

Four of the Baumholder runners

made it under the four-hour mark; the rest trickled in around the five-hour mark. "The goal was for everyone to finish — no one dropped dead or lost any legs, so I feel good about the outcome. My personal goal was to do it in under four hours, and I got in at 3:55," said Graham.

"If I do run another, it won't be for at least a year. I need time to recover, and then I'll find a new one with a different scenic route," said Graham.

Giessen and Friedberg's team included the Giessen Legal Center's Capt. Tim Hayes, Spc. Lisa Marie Gulley from the 16th Engineer Bat-

talion and Spc. Adrian Blackston, 1st Battalion, 36th Infantry.

"We tried to challenge other legal centers but they refused," said Hayes.

The group started preparation in June.

"We did the regular PT runs during the week and the longer runs, starting at nine miles and gradually increasing to 20 miles on weekends," said Hayes.

"I even lost 12 pounds," said Gulley.

The thought of ending the race before crossing the finish line came to their minds, they admitted.

"The challenge was at 20 miles. It's so tempting to just stop. It helped seeing new things but also to have the support of other runners," Hayes said.

"The cheering crowds kept us going. We received a lot of support from the spectators. Some kids even gave us high fives. Sometimes when people noticed you were about to give up they gave you more raves; they would get so excited when you smiled at them," said Gulley.

"There was a lot of support from the event organizers too. They had beds to give runners massages.

There was plenty of water, Gatorade, bananas. It was well organized," said Hayes.

"It was a great experience, it's something not everybody is doing and we received a medal," said Gully.

"I can only encourage other Soldiers to participate. They can find training materials on the Internet. It's a great chance to see different places and to stay in shape," Hayes said.
