

Elementary schools offer summer session

Struggling high school students can study online

Department of Defense Dependents Schools-Europe will keep one elementary school open in each base support battalion of the 104th Area Support Group from June 28 to July 23, said officials.

The half-day curriculum, devised as an additional support to families in communities affected by 1st Armored Division's extended deployment in Iraq, will include two hours of an integrated, multidisciplinary program and an hour of mathematics daily, said DoDDS-E officials.

Parents must arrange transportation for their children, and no lunch will be offered. Classes will be held daily from 9 a.m. to noon at Argonner, Giessen, Hainerberg and Wetzel Elementary Schools.

As most teachers wrapped up their academic years and prepared for the summer break, administrators tallied the number of students who would attend and assembled teaching staffs.

"We've got several folks, many of them spouses of military who are still in theater, who are interested in working with us for the summer," said Mark Benham, Hainerberg Elementary School principal. "I've got more applicants at the moment than I have slots for. I've been authorized six for our school, for the whole complex, and I'm trying to get authorization for a seventh because I've got lots of kids in kindergarten through sixth whose parents are interested in them going to summer school."

"Originally we had 105 submit their applications. That's what they based it on," said Dr. David Trukositz, Argonner Elementary School principal. "We have six classrooms, five in kindergarten through third, one will be grades four and five, and we have one sixth-grader."

Though the program was announced at the last minute, all schools reported they would be ready to welcome children June 28.

"We have some teachers from Springfield, two from here and one from Babenhausen," said Trukositz. "We're waiting to see how many are actually coming in. People said yes, but things can change

in people's lives in three weeks."

Students not showing up won't be a problem, he said, noting the large number of applications received. "We'll go straight to the waiting list," said Trukositz.

Principals agreed the majority of children attending will be in the lower grades, with enrollments thinning out in the upper grades.

"The numbers have basically broken out a little higher than what we like to have them, 18 students per teacher.

In kindergarten we maybe have enough for two teachers," said Benham. He estimated there would be about 120 children attending when the program begins June 28.

"Our teachers who stay to teach the summer session, many of them will hold their summer school classes in their classrooms from this year," said Benham.

"It's a great surprise," said Argonner first-grade teacher Hillary Gillett, who will teach a class this summer. In addition to supporting families with Soldiers in Iraq, she said the program will have positive benefits for the students involved.

"As a teacher you work hard all year to get them to a certain level, especially in early reading, and then you'd be surprised how much they lose. That's the thing that is really frustrating. If they don't get the reinforcement at home, we see the decline, especially at this early stage — we can tell," said Gillett.

"Kids really do better with constant reinforcement. Learning to read and write is like learning a new language. It's great and it's great to do summer school because we can do the enrichment activities, because during the year you're doing basics," she said.

Online remedial learning

In a separate development, small numbers of high school students from across the 104th ASG will have access to remedial distance learning programs. The two-week modules are for juniors and seniors experiencing academic difficulties, said DoDDS-E officials.

"It's designated specifically for graduating seniors who failed either math or English," said Baumholder American High School guidance counselor, Shirley Lips. Baumholder will have one student participate.

"It makes me feel good that all our other seniors graduated," said Lips, noting that 30 of the 36 are going on to two-year or four-year college programs. The school received inquiries from parents who wanted their high school age students to enroll, but participation was based on specific criteria, said Lips.

Hanau High School, which graduated 51 seniors June 3, had no seniors or juniors participating, said school officials.

Giessen Middle-High School, which graduated 23 students June 4, had 10 students apply. So far three have been accepted, said guidance counselor Edwina Smith.

Learning self-defense

Martial arts class aimed at helping people protect themselves

Discovering a fitness routine to develop one's mind and body isn't always simple. But the Tony Bass Fitness Center is making it easier for Soldiers and their families to find programs customized to their needs.

One such class currently being offered is Ving Tsun Kung Fu every Monday from 7:45-10 p.m. and Wednesday from 8:15-10 p.m. The class is designed for people 18 years of age or older and teaches self-defense, mental focus and physical conditioning.

"Ving Tsun Kung Fu is a self-defense style of Chinese Kung Fu developed by a Chinese nun for use on the streets by women," said Dr. Oliver Thorsten Wolfgang Grams, who is the class instructor, or "sifu," — Chinese for teacher. "Ving Tsun emphasizes self-defense reduced to its most streamlined rudiments, simultaneous attack and defense with multiple straight-line strikes at extremely close range." Ving Tsun isn't just about fighting. Grams said the self-confidence that comes with knowing a person can

defend him- or herself in any given situation reduces the need to actually fight. The air of confidence given off is usually enough to dissuade an aggressor from attacking.

In Ving Tsun each punch, poke, strike, slap or kick in the system serves as a defense. Similarly every block, deflection or evasion doubles as an attack.

"Within 10 weeks a student can effectively defend herself from an attacker. Of course she must train regularly and with focus, discipline and dedication, but it is an economic and useful martial arts program," he said. "It is very direct. Ving Tsun is not pretty and romantic like martial arts used in Hollywood movies. Ving Tsun is for defending yourself. When a big,

strong man wants to take a woman who may not be so strong he will do it quickly and she must know how to respond even quicker in order to get away."

Grams perfected Ving Tsun while studying under Grand Master Sifu Wong Shun Leung in Hong Kong. Sifu Wong was also known as the "King of the Talking Hands," who made his fame fighting challenges and teaching Bruce Lee.

Although the fighting style was designed by a woman for women, many men find it useful as well.

Classes are \$10 a session.

Youths get professional baseball class

Northern League players, coaches share their know-how with children of 'extended families'

It was a little like a Charlie Brown comic strip in Butzbach June 12, except instead of the Peanuts gang, Minor and Major League players took the field under soggy skies. As thunderstorms threatened to rain out the proceedings, 284th Base Support Battalion youths were treated to a priceless lesson in baseball know-how.

A team of players and coaches from the Northern League of Professional Baseball stopped in Butzbach Saturday during a five-day trip to Germany in support of U.S. military families. The visit, which included clinics, merchandise giveaways and autograph sessions, also featured stops in Schweinfurt, Hanau and Baumholder.

"It's just been an honor and really gratifying," said Mike Marshall, Northern League director of baseball operations and a 20-year professional baseball veteran who earned a World Series Championship ring with the Los Angeles Dodgers in 1988. "I always felt like, gosh, I wish there was something I could do for military families. I've got a couple of young ones and I can only imagine what the kids are giving up while their parents are away serving in Iraq."

The visit came about through a suggestion by a Kansas City newspaper columnist and brainstorming by a group of Kansas City radio station KMBZ disc jockeys, according to Russ Johnson, a KMBZ talk show host.

"A local columnist wrote a column about the prospect of bringing baseball to Iraq," said Johnson. "The Department of Defense thought it was too dangerous right now, but

thought it was important to help out the families.

"We talk about the war a lot on the air," said Johnson. "People are supportive of the war — there's an ebb and flow. That's how we were successful in raising so much cash. People wanted to say 'thank you.'"

In addition to helping promote the baseball clinic visit, the radio station also gener-

ated a fund drive to purchase telephone cards for the Veterans of Foreign Wars to be given to military members serving in harm's way.

"Our staff put on a lot of events to raise money for the phone cards. Maybe we can take this a step further in the future when it's safer over there and introduce it to kids in Iraq who aren't familiar with baseball at all," said Johnson.

"It's an honor to do it," said Bobby Bell, hitting coach with the Joliet JackHammers and a former catcher for the California Angels. "It's an opportunity to work with the kids. It feels good, because a lot of these kids have mothers and fathers who are protecting our country. It's just a great honor — just to see the smile on a kid's face."

"It's great," said Butzbach youngster Michael Abel. "I like batting the best because it's something I'm good at." Abel added that he hoped his father, who is serving in Iraq, would not miss another one of his birthdays.

Other members of the delegation included Ian Church, an outfielder with the Lincoln Saltdogs; Rickie Morton, first baseman for the Joliet JackHammers; Lyle Prempas, pitcher for the Schaumburg Flyers; Tim Doherty, coach of the Kansas City T-Bones; Darryl Motley, hitting coach with the Kansas City T-Bones; Pete Caliendo, president of the league's new Calgary franchise; and Jeff Loebel, president of the Sioux Falls Canaries.

"I think it's great," said Gregory Peck, 284th BSB Youth Services sports director. "It's really good to have these folks come out the help out with a lot of parents downrange."

While the weather and three-day weekend may have reduced participation in the clinic by local Butzbach youths, Peck added that a couple of YS championships also impacted the turnout. The 284th BSB Junior baseball team, the 104th Area Support Group champions, were in Vilseck battling for the next level championship, and the Giessen Bantams, the 104th ASG's East Division champs, were in Hanau battling for bantam bragging rights.
